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

Delivering our Prayers

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The holiday season is close upon us!

When I was growing up, my mom had a tradition we'd observe during Thanksgiving. It's the venerable tradition maybe you followed too, that is everyone around the table has to say what they're thankful for.

When I was younger I was absolutely mortified about this tradition. It wasn't that I wasn't thankful; I just didn't like to be forced to talk about it. But I grew to appreciate the sentiment. Because even if I'm struggling I'm still doing better than a lot of other people in this world. During the year it's easy to lose sight of that, and then become hardened to the suffering that's around us. It reminds me of what Christ calls us all to do if we call ourselves Christians, told in the following story:

A poor famer had an accident one day and broke his leg. That meant he would be laid up for a long time, unable to work. His family was large and needed help, so someone organized a prayer meeting at the church to pray for his family. While the people were praying, asking for God to help the family, there was a loud knock at the door. Someone tiptoed to the door, opened it, and there stood a young boy who said, "My dad couldn't attend the prayer meeting tonight, so he just sent his prayers in a wagon." And there was the wagon loaded with potatoes, meat, apples, and other produce from the farm.

This is what intercessory prayer (praying for others) is all about. Far from being an escape from involvement, it motivates us to help the person being prayed for in whatever way we can. Too often we hear someone say, 'I'll pray for you' but it's never followed up with any action. It's easy pray for God's will; it's another story to be God's agent for change. There may not be a higher calling! Christ says that those who serve the hungry, sick, imprisoned, poor, and lonely have served Christ himself.

There are several rituals we observe during the Thanksgiving and Christmas season. We buy presents, cook (and eat!) a lot of food, and attend and plan parties with family and co-workers. Another venerable tradition is the Angel Tree. Far from depressing, we are reminded of the children in our city who are in need and commit to buying them a couple of Christmas gifts. It's a small gesture that we can make to bless a child in a way we'd bless our own children.

This month, when the time comes, find an "angel" for Christmas. Once you're given one, don't just buy them gifts but commit as a family to pray for them by name every night. Pray that God will give them ease amidst suffering, joy instead of sorrow, and that their family make it through, and hopefully out of, poverty.


The following are the deadlines for the upcoming Parish Council elections:

November 9 – All absentee ballots must be received **November 10** – Election Day - end of liturgy until 1pm



October 11th through 14th, I was blessed to be able to attend the National Sisterhood of Presvyteres retreat in Delray Beach, Florida. Thank you so much to our parish leadership for choosing to sponsor this trip for me, and for all of you for welcoming and making my dear mother-in-law, Deb, feel at home here.



I had a beautiful time with my sister presvyteres learning about self-care and how to use it to fuel our unique ministry in the church, which is to be the wife of the priest.

Your priest loves you in a way no one else can. He loves you as your spiritual guide, a man who is responsible for your souls, and one who will be there for you when you are at your best, and when you are at your worst. At night, you are often the last thing he thinks about. He grieves with you. He celebrates with you. In short, he loves you, he worries about you, he thinks of you always. To attempt to keep a peaceful home, to encourage him, to pray for him our beautiful parish. To live and schedule our life in a way that makes him available to you when you need him. His ministry permeates nearly every aspect of his life, and so it does mine. And, while that is a blessing beyond imagination, it can also be exhausting. Sitting on a beach, worshipping in liturgy, learning in a conference room with seventy of my sister presvyteres were immeasurable gifts to me. 
NEW YORK – The faithful of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America glorify God as they receive with great joy the news from Mount Athos and our spiritual father, His All Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew, who announced the forthcoming canonization of four Athonite fathers: Elders leronymos of Simonopetra, Daniel Katounakiotis, Joseph the Hesychast and Ephraim Katounakiotis.

The First Monastic Synaxis of the Archdiocese of America that convened at the Holy Monastery of Saint Nektarios, Roscoe, NY., on Sept. 21-22 dedicated the next monastic meeting under the theme: "The spiritual heritage of Geron Joseph the Hesychast and his contribution to Orthodox Monasticism in America." The second Synaxis will take place Oct. 9-11, 2020 at the Holy Monastery of the Life Giving Spring, the Mother of God, in Fresno, California.



His Eminence Archbishop Elpidophoros of America, commenting on the forthcoming canonization of Elder Joseph, the Hesychast, said:

"We are grateful to our Patriarch and spiritual father because he proved once again that he knows how to listen to the feelings of his flock. We are especially blessed in America because the founder of monasticism here, Elder Ephraim, made sure that he would bring us the sacred skull of Elder Joseph, who is also his spiritual father. I look forward to the time when I will visit Arizona and venerate this relic, and it would be the relic of a saint of our Church in America".



"You think that your voice did not immediately reach the saints, our Panagia, and Christ. On the contrary, even before you cried out, the saints rushed to your aid, knowing that you would call upon them and seek their God-given protection. However, since you do not see beyond what is apparent and do not know how God governs the world, you want your request to be fulfilled like lightning. But this is not how things are. The Lord wants patience. He wants you to show your faith."





About the Icon on the Cover



This Apostle, who was also called Levi, was the son of Alphaeus and had Galilee as his homeland. A publican before being called by Christ, he became one of the Twelve Apostles, and an Evangelist. While still in Palestine, he wrote his Gospel first in Hebrew, being also the first of all to write the Gospel. When he is depicted in icons, there is portrayed next to him the likeness of a man, one of the symbolic living creatures mentioned by Ezekiel (1.10), which, as Saint Irenaeus writes, is a symbol of our Savior's Incarnation. He stands as an example to all of God's mercy and redemption in our lives. He also is Fr. Matthew's patron saint.

Apolytikion of The Apostle and Evangelist Matthew in the Third Mode

O holy Apostle and Evangelist Matthew, make intercession to our merciful God, that He grant our souls forgiveness of offenses.

Kontakion of The Apostle and Evangelist Matthew in the Fourth Mode

When you had shed the yoke of being a publican and took instead the yoke of justice and virtue, you proved yourself to be a clever merchant and most wise, gaining for yourself the wealth of the wisdom from heaven. Thus you preached the word of truth, O Evangelist Matthew. And you have roused from slothfulness our souls, clearly describing the hour of Judgment Day.
