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
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

Accountability

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Happy New Year! I hope you had a safe and happy Christmas season. Like many Americans you also may be making big goals for January 1. And it's reflected in the economy; gym membership signups rise dramatically, as does membership in Weight Watcher. Whether it's to lose weight, exercise more, smoke less, or even keep a journal, there's a real draw to the idea of 'new year, new you'. And so on January 1 we set out to make that big change, confident and hoping for the best, that will affect the rest of our life.

If only that were the case, though.

I read a psychological study that found 55% of New Year's Resolutions *fail by January 12*. And by February the attrition rises to 83%. While there are a number of reasons this failure is the case, researchers found that those who were most successful in their resolutions were those who joined with groups of people, whom they could both check in with and check up on. In other words, they were more successful because they had accountability in their lives. It's exponentially more difficult to effect change on our own.

We Christians have a similar phenomenon in our relationship with Christ and the Church. We mistakenly think we have the ability to be better Christians on our own. We might say we'll come to Liturgy more, pray more, curse less, be less negative, practice loving people without attachments. I referenced our "Spiritual New Year's" resolutions back in September; our life in Christ is constantly changing and requires our vigilant attention. And just like exercise, or anything else, without accountability we're setting ourselves up to fail. Two-thousand years of Church history tells us: our relationship with Christ grows and flourishes only in the presence of other Christians. But what if we could grow without judgment, fear, or embarrassment? What if we had a connection to a personal trainer, someone who pushes us, wants for us to be better? We do!

The Sacrament of Confession is for us accountability par excellence. Each one of us, as Orthodox Christians, has the opportunity to avail ourselves to a Father Confessor. In your Father Confessor you have a man who loves you unconditionally, no matter your sins, shames, or failings. You have a man who will go before God with you to make your confession, to lovingly encourage and correct you, and declare God's forgiveness in your life. What's even better is that there's really no limit to how many visits you make, and it's always confidential. No, really. The sacrament of confession is so serious that our privacy is legally binding. We're not to divulge what transpires in confession even when it risks our life.

No empty promises, no fluff. Just you and your Father Confessor, relying on God's grace to lead you along the path towards Christ.



About the Icon on the Cover



ST. ANTHONY THE GREAT

Saint Anthony, the Father of monks, was born in Egypt in 251 of pious parents who departed this life while he was yet young. On hearing the words of the Gospel: "If thou wilt be perfect, go and sell what thou hast, and give to the poor" (Matt. 19:21), he immediately put it into action. Distributing to the poor all he had, and fleeing from all the turmoil of the world, he departed to the desert. The manifold temptations he endured continually for the span of twenty years are incredible. His ascetic struggles by day and by night, whereby he mortified the uprisings of the passions and attained to the height of dispassion, surpass the bounds of nature; and the report of his deeds of virtue drew such a multitude to follow him that the desert was transformed into a city, while he became, so to speak, the governor,

lawgiver, and master-trainer of all the citizens of this newly-formed city.

Saint Anthony began his ascetic life outside his village of Coma in Upper Egypt, studying the ways of the ascetics and holy men there, and perfecting himself in the virtues of each until he surpassed them all. Desiring to increase his labors, he departed into the desert, and finding an abandoned fortress in the mountain, he made his dwelling in it, training himself in extreme fasting, unceasing prayer, and fierce conflicts with the demons. Here he remained, as mentioned above, about twenty years. Saint Athanasius the Great, who knew him personally and wrote his life, says that he came forth from that fortress "initiated in the mysteries and filled with the Spirit of God."

Apolytikion of Anthony the Great - Fourth Tone

O Father Anthony, you imitated the zealous Elijah. You followed the straight paths of the Baptist and became a desert dweller. By prayer you confirmed the universe. Wherefore, intercede with Christ our God to save our souls.
